


YEAR IN REVIEW







TOTAL DEPARTMENT EMERGENCY CALLS

The Missoula Fire Department (MFD) collects and reports data to the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS). NFIRS collects data based on the following nine categories:

Fire, Overpressure Rupture/Explosion/Overheat (No Fire), Rescue and Emergency Medical Service Incidents, Hazardous Condition (No Fire), Service Call, Good Intent Call, False Alarm and False Call, Severe Weather and Natural Disaster, and Special Incident Type.





In National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards, particularly NFPA 1710 and 1720, the 90th percentile is a key performance metric used to establish a reliable and consistent level of service for emergency response. It indicates the time within which 90% of all emergency calls must receive a specific service (e.g., first unit arrival, full effective response force on scene).







