I've noticed in the past few years with the addition of a new truck stop several businesses down in the valley using newer LED lights. I see the new industrial/residential area off Moccasin lane is beginning & I'm wondering if any codes will be implemented requiring the use of a light cover? The reason being several businesses do not use them and they create an incredible amount of light pollution. From my front yard it looks at night like several cars with their brights on are coming directly at you, along with creating light upwards and thus drowning out the sky.
