



Building a Safer, More Connected Missoula for All

Message from Jeremy Keene, Director of Public Works & Mobility

Missoula counts on us to keep streets safe and connected. This year, we delivered on that promise.

We opened the Scott Street roundabout, a major project that strengthens one of the city's busiest north-south routes. The new roundabout improves access for everyone who drives, bikes, or walks. Wider sidewalks, clear bike lanes, improved street lighting, and safer approaches reflect what our Northside friends and neighbors have been asking for—better options to move through town with confidence.

On Phillips Street, we installed a new school speed zone and crosswalk enhancements after residents raised concerns about safety. These changes help protect children walking to school and families living

in the neighborhood. Listening to community feedback and acting responsively made a difference where people live every day.

Across the city, our teams continue to work to improve intersections, add crosswalks, and upgrade signals. These projects share a common goal: streets that work better for friends, families, and neighbors.

Thank you, Missoula, for speaking up about your needs and ideas. Your input guides every improvement we make. Together, we're building a safer, stronger Missoula.

Collaboration Leads to Better Safety for Missoula's Westside & Northside

Our community asked us to help slow traffic and improve safety. We acted.

This summer, Public Works & Mobility (PWM) delivered a series of strategic transportation improvements that make the Westside and Northside neighborhoods safer for children, families, and community members travelling to and from Lowell Elementary. Working collaboratively, the PWM team completed the project in just forty-five days and came in almost \$80,000 under budget.

On August 22, 2025, we unveiled the new safety enhancements as well as the new roundabout at Scott Street and Phillips Street. The single-lane design naturally slows speeds, eases congestion, and makes crossings shorter and clearer. We also widened sidewalks, added buffered bike lanes on the Scott Street Bridge, improved lighting, and marked parking spaces to bring more order to the corridor.

"These improvements are about one thing—safety," said Brandt Dahlen, Scott Street Project Lead and Surface Project Coordinator. "The new roundabout and corridor upgrades mean slower speeds, clearer crossings, and safer routes for people of all ages walking and biking."

We reinforced this work with quick-build bulb-outs at Phillips and Hawthorne to open sightlines, refreshed striping at Phillips and Shakespeare with durable epoxy paint, and added portable flashing beacons at Phillips and Hawthorne. These beacons highlight one of the busiest walking routes into Lowell and Westside Park. We also coordinated with the Missoula Police Department to increase presence when school began and worked with Parks and Recreation to trim trees along walking routes.

We backed up these physical improvements with speed study data and resulting policy action. This past August, our engineers presented findings to the Missoula City Council recommending a speed reduction on Phillips Street. After discussion, the Council voted to reduce the Lowell school zone to

15 MPH between 6:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. We installed new signs the very next morning, before the first day of school. These additional actions further enhance community safety for both pedestrians and drivers.

The Westside and Northside are just two neighborhoods that will see more upgrades in the coming years. Through our Neighborhood Traffic Management Program, we will continue working with residents to add traffic-calming features where they are most needed.

We measure success by how safe and supported people feel when they travel in Missoula. These improvements show what we can achieve when we listen, act quickly, and partner with our community. Together, we are creating streets that work for everyone.

Local Partnerships Make Grant Creek Restoration Vision a Reality

Public Works set to complete City portion this fall.

The City of Missoula Public Works & Mobility Department made big strides in Phase 1 of the Grant Creek Restoration Project in 2025. This effort restores an important urban waterway and reduces flooding risks while improving wildlife habitat and water quality.

The project's success stems from strong collaboration between the City, private landowners, Missoula Montana Airport, the Grant Creek Working Group, and the Clark Fork Coalition. Together, we're relocating the creek's channel, rebuilding its natural floodplain, and planting thousands of native plants to stabilize banks and create habitat.

"This is the kind of partnership that makes Missoula stronger," said Andy Schultz, City Engineer for Utilities at Public Works & Mobility. "Restoring Grant Creek is good for fish, good for people, and good for our community."

Engineer Chris Fuchs agrees: "I'm working on a once-in-a-lifetime project and making my community better. It

doesn't get better than that."

When complete, Grant Creek will flow more naturally, slow down during high water, better protect downstream neighborhoods from potential flooding, and include a future recreation trail.

Missoula is leading by example—showing how infrastructure, environment, and community can work together.

Fall pickup starts November 3.

Missoula's annual leaf collection program begins Monday, November 3, 2025, weather permitting. Rake leaves into long, narrow piles along the curb two to three days before your scheduled pickup. Keep piles out of bike lanes and driving lanes.

Keep Missoula Green This Fall With Garden City Compost



At [Garden City Compost](#), we're working to help keep Missoula Green by turning more than 24,000 tons of compostable material into rich soil every year. Additionally, the City's Resource Recovery Facility's solar farm and methane capture system generate up to 40% of the energy we use at our facility on Clark Fork Lane—clean, local power right here at home. You can help keep Missoula green and our storm drains clear, too!

- Drop off your leaves for free during the City's annual leaf collection program. Properly disposing of leaves prevents flooding and ice buildup, protects your lawn, and helps protect air and water quality.
- Recycle your undecorated Christmas tree after the holidays. Composting your tree with us keeps even more waste out of the landfill and helps lower greenhouse gas emissions.

Winter is Coming - And So Are Our Plows

During the heart of the winter season, Street Division crews strive to keep streets as safe as possible by plowing snow and apply deicer and sand. We also have staff on stand-by for weekend snow. [Visit our website to view the current map](#) and stay up to date on all things snow removal this year.



PRIORITY 1
GOAL: 48 HRS
School bus routes, public transit routes, and high-volume streets. Cleared within 48 hours after the snow stops.

PRIORITY 2
GOAL: 96 HRS
Fire routes, Neighborhood Greenways, collector streets, and local streets with steeper grades. Cleared within 96 hours after the snow stops.

Remaining neighborhood streets with lower traffic volumes will be plowed by area using our fleet of pickups and heavy plows as resources are available. Stay up to date this winter at ci.missoula.mt.us/558/Snow-Removal.
